The anxiety subscale positively predicts the anxiety dimension of adult attachment ( $r=0.29$ ), manifest anxiety ( $r=0.25$ ), neuroticism ( $0.31$ ), a controlling image of God ( $r=0.35$ ), and extrinsic religious motivation ( $r=0.38$ ), whereas it negatively predicts of agreeableness ( $r=0.21$ ), a loving image of God ( $r=0.28$ ), and intrinsic religious motivation ( $r=0.29$ ).
