A phrase is any collection of words that behaves like a part of speech, like a noun phrase (“my brother Stu”), an adjectival

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phrase (“in a different shade of blue”), or an adverbial phrase (“with elegance and tact”). A clause is any noun phrase plus a verb; they can be sentences, but they don’t always have to be. You’ll see!

Clauses are the building blocks of the English language. Any sentence that you write which has a subject (the doer of the action) and a verb (an action word) is called a clause. Whereas a phrase is a group of words which makes sense but not complete sense, a clause makes complete sense.

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
